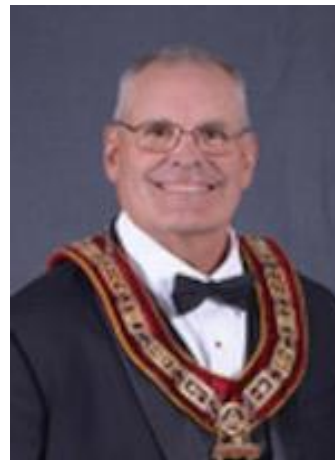

Even a simple Chapter BBQ and Corn Hole event, just for Chapter families, requires planning on the part of the “organizers” to be successful. How much more planning does an event require when the Chapter wishes to involve the local community, obtain local business sponsors, etc. take?

District 4 of the Blue Lodge holds a golf tournament every year, suspended for COVID in 2020, and the results are fairly impressive. In 2019 the tournament raised over \$8,000.00 after all expenses and prizes were paid out. This was not planned overnight, and each Lodge had a specific task to accomplish. The 2021 tournament raised a similar amount. The District 4 DDGM Trophy is awarded to the Lodge with the highest participation, players and funds donated, as an added incentive. We start planning for the next tournament well in advance, say 6 months, of the next one. Your Royal Arch District can apply the same principles to your next event.

This is just an example of what can be accomplished by applying the 7 Ps. Any event will be more successful when it is the beneficiary of advance planning.

Finally, Companions, Valentine's Day has passed, 14 February, and I hope that we all remembered our loved ones, especially those who may not have realized it occurred and has passed.
